Cerebral palsy (CP) is a problem that affects muscle tone, movement, and motor skills. It hinders the body's ability to move in a coordinated and purposeful way. It also can affect other body functions that involve motor skills and muscles, like breathing, bladder and bowel control, eating, and talking. CP often is caused by brain damage that happens before or during a baby's birth, or during the first 3-to-5 years of a child's life.

Cerebral palsy is caused by damage to the fetal or infant brain. It occurs when there is neurological damage before, during, or within five years of birth that prevents the brain from developing properly. Damage to the parts of the brain that control motor function causes children with CP to struggle with posture, balance and movement.

Cerebral palsy is a neurological disorder that occurs in children due to damage to those parts of the brain that control motor skills. It is a permanent damage, and cannot be completely cured. However, through special care and training, children affected by this condition can be helped to develop skills

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required for leading a normal life.

The main symptoms of cerebral palsy are problems with movement, co-ordination and development. Possible signs in a child include: delays in reaching development milestones - for example, not sitting by 8 months or not walking by 18 months seeming too stiff or too floppy (hypotonia)

Cerebral palsy is the most common physical impairment in childhood. Current estimates suggest that one in every 400 children is affected by cerebral palsy. This means about 1,800 babies are diagnosed with cerebral palsy in the UK every year. Cerebral palsy affects people from all social backgrounds and ethnic groups.
