Connotation is the associated meaning of the word beyond the literal definition. Before introducing the definitions, explain that the word, connotation, is used in two different ways. Students will practice both. Connotation 1 (emotional charge): Every word has a negative, positive or neutral connotation or association. In this case, understanding connotation enhances understanding of the implied meaning, tone and purpose beyond a word's literal definition.
