Ford Madox Ford. 1873-1939. Born in Wimbledon in 1873 as Ford Madox Hueffer (he changed his name in 1919) Ford founded The English Review in 1908 and The Transatlantic Review in 1924. He worked for the War Propaganda Bureau after the outbreak of the First World War. After writing two propaganda books he enlisted, at the age of 41, in the Welch Regiment on 30 July 1915 and was sent to France.
